# MEINHARDI BUILDING UPDATE by Helen Fink

Montague-Whitehall Rotary has given us a generous matching grant of up to \$3500 to build cabinets and counters in the Meinhardi building! Ken Giddus, a local craftsman, skilled in restoration work, will build them with period woods and fixtures. We need at least \$2500 more for the this project's completion. (Mr. Giddus has given us an estimate of \$5-7,000 depending on our final design.)

### Since moving the building, we have accomplished a lot:

new cedar shake roof and front façade installed front and back stairs brought electricity to the property scraped and stained exterior (cont.) interior carpentry and repair a beautiful ceiling repair and staining installed an all season heating and cooling unit created a lovely brick patio (it's not too late to buy a brick!) created a charming medicinal herb garden interior painting interior lighting and electrical outlets installed security system erected handicap access

What's left to do? Cabinetry and counters ( we need \$2500 more to do this), floor refinishing, artifact placement (we have a commitment of \$5000 to procure artifacts!), signage, and minor landscaping. So with the help of this community, we are nearing completion!

### **Historic Preservation Awards**

The 2013 personal residence winners of this award were Jeff and Dawn Auch, both enthusiastic gardeners for their home at 8605 Old Channel Trail, located across Knudsen St. from the old Ferry Memorial Church. In the past six years of residency, they have improved the house, added a chicken house, and developed their double lot with many gardening and permaculture features, reducing the need for lawn and lawn mowing.

The 2013 commercial winner of the Historic Preservation Award was Pekadill's. Their original structure was built in 1873 by two brothers from Norway. Its adaptive reuse began with its progression from granary to meat market before being shuttered in 1983. It was then restored and reopened as the current ice cream parlor and sandwich shop in 1989, celebrating its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year.

Many thanks to committee members Cassie Ellis, Ellie Dennis, Cal and Jane Lane, Ruth Pitkin, Lois Ekstrand, and Roger Scharmer for their work in observing and selecting the winners of this yearly award.
